

ELENA course – credibility assessment in asylum claims A training course for legal representatives, lawyers specialized on asylum cases and NGO practitioners, Madrid 5-7 May 2014

The <u>Hungarian Helsinki Committee</u>, the <u>European Council on Refugees and Exiles (ECRE)</u> and the <u>European Legal Network on Asylum (ELENA)</u> are delighted to invite you to the "ELENA course – credibility assessment in asylum claims", to be held in **Madrid** on **5-7 May 2014**. The event is partially funded by the European Commission, with the support of the UNHCR Bureau for Europe.

PARTICIPANTS

The course is aimed at NGO legal practitioners, lawyers, decision makers and staff of national asylum authorities as well as researchers and those working in international and non-governmental organisations which specialise in asylum law. The conference will bring together around **90 participants** from all EU member states. The organizers aim to ensure a **proper geographic balance** and to particularly facilitate the participation of ELENA coordinators; legal representatives and lawyers from Southern and Eastern EU member states are also highly encouraged to apply.

PROGRAMME

The course will include **plenary sessions** facilitated by a group of prominent experts and academics. See the preliminary agenda overleaf; the final programme and list of speakers will be available in April 2014.

LANGUAGE

The course will be held in **English**. The participants are expected to have an advanced level of understanding and conversation skills in English.

<u>COSTS</u>

Participation in the course is **free of charge**. Moreover, due to the support of the European Refugee Fund, **limited subsidies are available to cover the cost of accommodation, meals and travel for a limited number of participants**. Priority will be given to ELENA national coordinators and participants from Southern and Eastern EU member states. Please indicate in your registration form if you require your costs of participation to be covered by the organizers. Depending on the resources available, the organizers will get back to you regarding the technicalities.

Please note that we have an indicative quota for participants coming from each member state in order to ensure balanced participation and a truly European dialogue during the conference. The training course is part of the **"Building Credibility" (CREDO 2)** project, implemented by the Hungarian Helsinki Committee (lead applicant) together with the UNHCR Bureau for Europe, ECRE and Asylum Aid. The overall goal of the project is to provide access for all **stakeholders in the EU asylum sector to knowhow on how to conduct a structured, objective and protection-oriented credibility assessment**.
