

# **Hungary: Key Asylum Figures for the First Quarter of 2018**

#### How many?

Measures taken by Hungarian law enforcement authorities against irregular migrants

As a result of the "8-kilometre rule" legalising push-backs, the daily limit of people admitted to enter the transit zone (1-1 person during working days since January 2018), and the changes that entered into force on 28 March 2017<sup>1</sup> the number of registered asylum applications remains low.

In the first quarter of 2018, **233** asylum-seekers were **granted protection** (of which 23 were refugee and 210 were "subsidiary protection" statuses) while **266** applications were rejected.

#### From where?

In the first three months of 2018, the majority of asylum-seekers (85 %) came from war- and terror-torn countries, including 8 % from Syria, 41,5 % from Afghanistan, and 35,5 % from Iraq. Of all the applicants, 57,5 % were children and 41,7 % women.

### **Dublin transfers**

Not a single asylum-seeker was **returned to Hungary** under the Dublin Regulation in the first quarter of 2018. Hungary transferred **23** asylum-seekers to other states: primarily to Germany (9) Austria (5) and Italy (4).

According to the <u>changes that entered into force on 28 March 2017</u>, the so-called "8-kilometre rule" is applicable to the entire territory of Hungary when a "state of crisis due to mass migration" is in effect. The government proclaimed a nationwide "state of crisis due to mass migration" and it was in effect throughout the first quarter of 2018.
